

**5**<sup>th</sup> **Sunday of Lent –** The teacher gave her class a math paper. The first instruction on the test was: "read through all the questions on this paper before you begin to write your answers." There then followed a list of thirty mathematical puzzles to solve.

Needless to say, most students launched straight into the questions, working feverishly their way though to the end. It was only then that they discovered that the final question turned out not to be a question at all but another instruction. It said: "Now that you have read through this test paper, please ignore all the questions above and simply stand up and quietly leave the room." The observant students – who followed the first instruction to only read through all the questions before they started answering – passed the test simply by getting up and walking out of the room after a couple of minutes. It was a great lesson to teach the students to follow direction, and not to rush to give an answer or make a judgement.

There's a great deal of making rushed judgements and demanding immediate answers in today's Gospel. Only Jesus seems to take the time carefully to read the whole situation. He resists the temptation to offer a hasty response or a simple "yes" or "no" answer to the question the Scribes and Pharisees put to Him. Instead, Jesus gathers His thoughts. He bends down and starts doodling in the dust, pondering, reflecting, seeing the wider picture.

The woman is merely a means to an end. The Scribes and Pharisees have no interest in her – they just want to trap Jesus – again. Jesus is aware of their motives. But also, unlike His opponents, He is aware of the person involved. They make her stand in full view of everyone. They separate her from the rest of the people. It's easier to judge and condemn someone who is singled out as different, other, not one of us. Physically and psychologically they isolate the woman. Jesus does the exact opposite; He connects her to them. Whatever the reason for the woman's adultery, whether she was victim or wrongdoer, Jesus' response: "If there is one of you who has not sinned, let him be the first to throw a stone," has the effect of reconnecting her to her accusers. For who has not committed sin" Who does not stand in need of the mercy of God? Once that connection is made, it becomes impossible for anyone to condemn or harm the woman, for in doing so they would be condemning themselves. Jesus reminds them – and us – of what unites us as human beings; and when that happens, compassion and mercy become not only possible but the only options left open. That wider context really is everything.

It is often noted that Jesus doesn't condone the woman's sin. He points her forward to a different future, a different way of living. "I forget the past and I strain ahead for what is still to come," St Paul says. "No need to recall the past," God tells us in the first reading from the prophet Isaiah. God is providing a symbolic river in the desert, so that they may drink. That river is the mercy of God freely offered to all who put their faith in Jesus. Pope Francis tells us that "the name of God is mercy." That mercy is life-giving and transforms us so that, like the woman in the Gospel, we cease to live in isolation, held captive by our history. And like the Pharisees, we can no longer live apart, in the desert of superiority, judgement and condemnation. When we truly experience God's mercy, it's not just our view of ourselves that is transformed, but our understanding of humanity and our place in it. Judgement and condemnation are replaced by compassionate awareness of our solidarity and communion with the whole human family.

### An Invitation

This is an invitation to any Parishioner to be part of the Foot Washing Ritual done at the 7PM Mass on <u>Holy Thursday, April 18th.</u> In past years, over 95

parishioners, young or old, have participated in the Ritual. The procedure for the Ritual is as follows:

- 1) You sit at the end of a pew or, if a family, sit in the first pew in any pew section.
- 2) After the Homily (Sermon) you remove one sock and shoe from one foot.
- 3) Father Dave and the servers come to you and you hold your foot over the basin. Father pours water over your foot, imitating the washing of feet that Jesus did for the Apostles over 2000 years ago.
- 4) Father uses a clean towel to dry your foot;
- 5) You put your sock and shoe back on.
- 6) You can move to another pew, if you wish.

The ritual is explained more fully in Chapter 13 of the Gospel of John:

If I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet,

then surely you must wash one another's feet...

I give you a new commandment, love one another as I have loved you.


